

2018 Bell Live Series at the King Eddy lineup announced!

- King Eddy returns for 10 days of live music during Stampede Week from July 6-15
- Historic hotel to permanently re-open as live music venue on July 20

(Calgary, AB — June 7, 2018) The historic King Eddy kicks into high-gear as a pop-up country bar with the return of the Bell Live Series from July 6-15. The venue will then re-open as a permanent live music venue, bar and restaurant with regular hours beginning on July 20.

For 10 days during the Calgary Stampede, the King Eddy will once again be transformed into a honky-tonk in the East Village, featuring a revolving roster of boot-stompin' country acts performing evening headliner shows. House band Ghostboy featuring Mark Parsons will perform free daytime sets from noon to 3:00 pm daily. Advance tickets for all evening headliner shows go on sale on June 7 at 10:00 am at kingeddy.ca, the brand new King Eddy website.

"We've provided a taste of the resurrected King Eddy over the past two years by piloting successful live music programs like the Bell Live Series, and we're excited to bring it back with another great lineup," said Andrew Mosker, President and CEO of the National Music Centre. "Opening the King Eddy as a permanent live music venue, bar and restaurant will allow us to greatly expand our programming mandate, attract new audiences, and continue to build on the Eddy's storied musical legacy."

The Bell Live Series at the King Eddy will run daily from July 6-15, 11:30 am to 2:00 am. Admission is free during the day and a cover will be in place after 7:00 pm until close for all headliner shows. Check kingeddy.ca for headliner ticket prices.

Studio Bell will be open seven days a week until September 3, before returning to regular hours, Wednesday to Sunday, 10 am to 5 pm. The King Eddy will open on Friday, July 20. Regular hours are Monday to Wednesday, 11 am to 10 pm; Thursday and Friday, 11 am to 2 am; Saturday, 9 am to 2 am; and Sunday, 9 am to 10 pm. About the King Eddy

The King Edward Hotel originally opened in 1905 on what was then referred to as Whisky Row (9 Avenue). This workingman's hotel and bar saw the rise of Calgary and was even the first desegregated bar in the city. In the 1980s, the Eddy — as locals lovingly call it — became known as a live music venue, specifically for blues music. Dubbed "Calgary's home of the blues," the Eddy welcomed some of the greats, such as John Hammond, Buddy Guy, Pintetop Perkins and Otis Rush. After being condemned, the building was acquired by the National Music Centre to restore it and anchor its new facility around it. The King Eddy was restored much like an artifact and is now breathing new life as a live music venue that NMC and other community partners can program.
